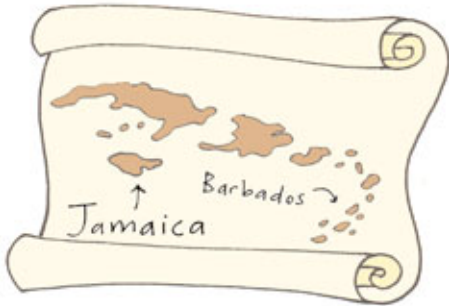

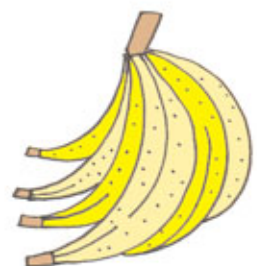
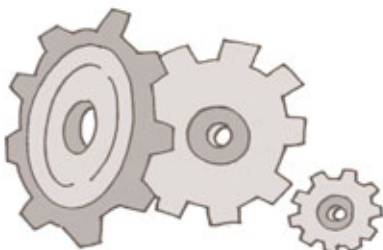

The West India Docks were the first of the large, enclosed docks. They were opened in 1802. Before this, ships had to be loaded and unloaded in the Pool of London (the widest part of the river near the City - below London Bridge)

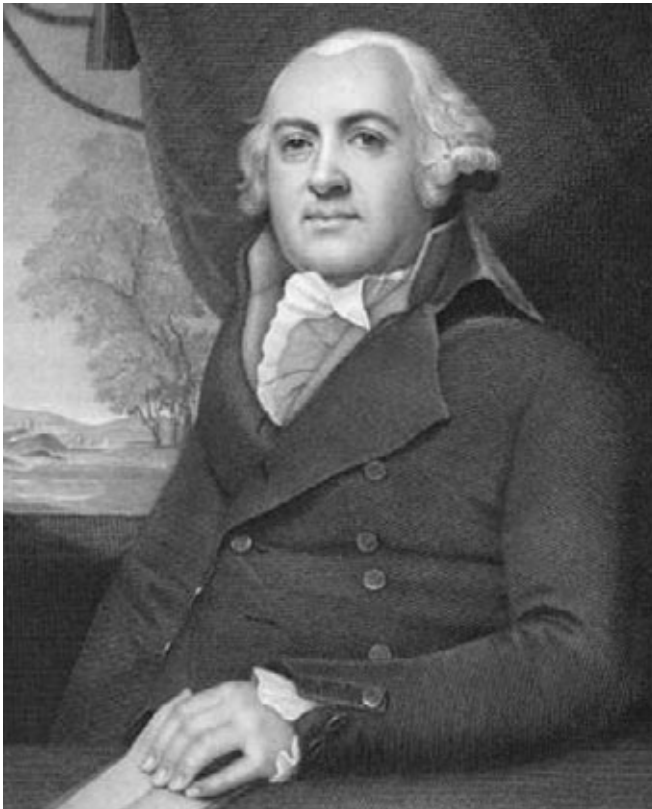

What was built to ensure the dock was completely secure?

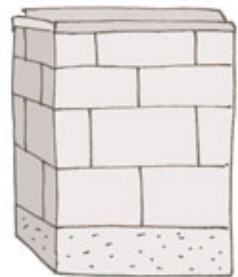
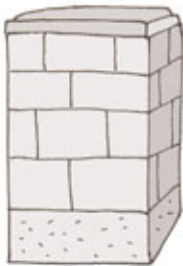
